Structure, Governance and Management

NEMT is a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO) under the Scottish Charitabe Organisations Regulations 2011.

Trustee Appointment

NEMT is managed by a Council of not more than ten individual Members and as many representatives of Organisational Members as wish to have their representative on the Council. The overall minimum number of members of the Council shall be six.

Objectives and Activities

The North East Mountain Trust (NEMT) is an association of climbers and hillwalkers in northeast Scotland. Its main aim is to conserve the upland, coastal and rural environments of northeast Scotland for the benefit of the public wishing to take non-motorised recreation there, both now and in the future. It acts as an umbrella group of hillwalking and mountaineering clubs.

During the year, NEMT continued to campaign on the following topics:

- Grouse moor management, focussing on the damaging effects of the trend to more intensive management, and also the illegal activities of gamekeepers. This included attending the SNH meeting at Battleby to discuss the results of the recent project on counting mountain hares and also working with other NGOs on getting driven grouse shooting in Scotland licensed.
- Deer management, focussing on the need to bring numbers down to sustainable levels.
- Developments at Cairngorm Mountain, focussing on both the need for environmental considerations to be given proper weight and for Natural Retreats, the tenant, to follow existing planning requirements, particularly the production of a master plan for future activities. Following the collapse of subsidiary Cairngorm Mountain Ltd, this is now redundant.
- The continuing proliferation of hill tracks both for driven grouse shooting and also for the construction of small scale hydro schemes. This year, LINK published its report on the Prior Notification system, with NEMT playing a major role in its compilation. The report has been taken up by Andy Wightman MSP who is seeking an amendment as part of the Planning (Scotland) Bill process to bring moorland and hill tracks fully under the planning system. We objected or commented on a number of hill track and hydro track proposals, with mixed success, including three of the seven proposed tracks in Glen Etive, a Wild Land Area of particular note.
- The need for full restoration of the construction track built for the Beauly-Denny pylon line.

We replied to the following consultations:

- Peatland & Energy Policy Statement
- Guidance on Engaging Communities in Decisions Relating to Land
- Corrie Fee NNR Management Plan
- Planning (Scotland) Bill
- CNPA Local Development Plan: Main Issues Report
- CNPA Forest Strategy

We objected to the following planning applications:

- Renewal of the lapsed planning application for An Camas Mor, the proposed new town near Aviemore, including the relaxation of earlier planning conditions
- Construction of a golf course on a protected area at Coul Links
- Two dry ski slopes beside the Coire Cas carpark at Cairngorm Mountain. The application was later refused by the Park Authority
- A small number of proposed windfarms in areas either with valued landscapes or designated as Wild Land. In particular, we objected to the proposed Glendye windfarm on our doorstep. The Cullachy (Coireyairack) and Caplich (Wild Land Area 34) windfarms were refused.

NEMT donated money to the Save Bennachie Alliance, and I'm pleased to report that their campaign has been successful. Very well done.

We published an updated annual work plan in our biannual publication "*Mountain Views*". A stand at the annual Ramblers Scotland Council meeting gave an opportunity to promote our activities. Our programme of six winter

lectures has gone from strength to strength – a tribute to the hard work and enthusiasm of our new lectures organiser. Thank you.

Finally a big thank you to all our members who contributed in any way, eg contributing to the above or writing to their local MSP.
